Biographies of London Mercers contributed by Dr. Anne F. Sutton

Sutton's Bios: Anne F. Sutton, "Biographies of the London Mercers," Typescript. MLD has electronically harvested from a Microsoft Word document c. 3500 'biographies' of members of the Mercers Company in medieval London, compiled by Dr Sutton as chronological lists of references. The biographies are placed in the Activity field of MLD, although relevant data are also placed in such MLD fields as Identifier (distinguishing apprentices and masters), Citizen, Craft, Year (the year of the first reference to the individual) and Year_Range. Each line in the Activity field starts with a date, followed by the event (primarily the payment of fines and fees as apprentices, members, and liverymen), and ends with an abbreviation indicating the source of the information.

<u>Sutton's Editorial Practice:</u> Following MLD guidelines, we replicated the information in the Sutton bios as closely as possible. Below are notes offered by Dr Sutton on her editorial practice in compiling the biographies.

Mercer= member of the Mercers' Company

[mercer] = a member of the company but not so described in the record recited.

mercer = so called in the record but not necessarily in the company; in most cases this means someone living before the company's records begin.

Spelling of the Christian names have been modernized where possible. Surnames have been standardized; place names are modernized. There are one or two famous exceptions to this rule e.g., Richer de Refham. Variant spellings are given at the beginning of a biography.

For the period 1390-1527 the entries are largely based on the cards compiled by Jean Imray using WA and AC; research done by A. F. Sutton has been added, but there may be additional material and conclusions in her printed work. We have left as is questions or uncertainties noted by Sutton (in capital letters). The inclusion in square brackets of dates of admission to the freedom is taken each time from Coke's register (Names of all Freemen of the Company from the 22 year of King Edward the Third, anno 1347). This was started by John Coke, clerk to the Company, in 1528, and has been continued into the twentieth century. one may note that there are a number of problems over names and dates of the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries given in this source.
